How to Prepare for Veterinary School

- Obtain a good science background in high school. Try to take as many of the available science courses at your high school as you can.
- Work with animals and veterinarians.
 Volunteer or paid jobs in small animal practices, stables, humane societies, research laboratories, wildlife clinics, zoos, or farms can help you decide if this really is the right career for you and which areas of the field you like best. Gaining practical experience will also show our Admissions
 Committee that you are a motivated and committed applicant.
- Attend a four-year accredited college or university to receive a bachelor's degree. It doesn't matter whether you select a large state university, a small private liberal arts college, or a small public college. Whatever college you choose, enroll in the most challenging courses you can and do your best possible work!
- While in college, take the prerequisite courses necessary to apply to veterinary school. Your advisor can help you plan.
- Take a good look at what each veterinary school will offer you. Of the thirty schools in the United States which offer DVM degree programs, Cummings School stands out for its range of veterinary activities, state-of-the-art facilities, academic reputation, and prominent faculty. Our commitment to a leadership role in the humane care and treatment of animals is emphasized throughout the veterinary program.
- Attend the Adventures in Veterinary Medicine program. This career exploration program is offered to middle school, high school, and college students as well as "transitional" adults.
